Summary of purpose and/or changes:

LB 481 relates to applicants for an initial license to practice a profession which is authorized to prescribe controlled substances. Current law requires such applicants to submit to a criminal history background check (section 71-104.01). LB 481 provides that an applicant for a temporary educational permit will have 90 days from the issuance of the permit to comply with the background check requirement. At the end of that period, the permit will either be (1) suspended

if the background check is not completed, or (2) revoked if the background check reveals that the applicant is unqualified for the permit.

Explanation of amendments, if any:

The committee amendment (AM 270) changes provisions relating to licensure for the practice of medicine and surgery. Current law provides that applicants for licensure to practice medicine and surgery and osteopathic medicine and surgery must successfully complete all parts of the licensing examination within seven years. AM 270 increases the period within which to successfully complete the required examinations to ten years. The amendment conforms to provisions found in LB 463, which has an operative date of December 1, 2008.
