Dear Mr. O'Donnell:

Nebraska Revised Statutes § 81-3133(1)(b) requires the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Children and Family Services to report in writing beginning with the third calendar quarter of 2012 on its expenditures for each quarter and the outcome relating to such expenditures within 30 days after the quarter to the Appropriations and Health and Human Services committees. Pursuant to this law, we are submitting our report of these expenditures and related outcomes for the quarter beginning April 1, 2015 through June 30, 2015.

Additionally, the statute requires that the report shall identify any changes or movement of funds between subprograms in excess of \$250,000 relating to child welfare in Budget Program 347. Beginning July 1, 2012, child welfare funds were transferred from Budget Program 347 to Budget Program 354. As a result, there are no changes or movement of funds between subprograms related to child welfare in Budget Program 347 to report.

#### **General Information**

Nebraska Revised Statutes § 81-3133: "On or before July 30, 2015, the Division of Children and Family Services of the Department of Health and Human Services shall report in writing its expenditures between April 1, 2015 and June 30, 2015, and the outcomes relating to such expenditures to the Appropriations Committee of the Legislature and the Health and Human Services Committee of the Legislature. Such report shall identify any changes or movement of funds in excess of two hundred fifty thousand dollards relating to child welfare between subprograms within Budget Program 347."

Neb. Rev. Stat. § 81-3133(1)(3) states: "It is the intent of the Legislature that appropriations of funds for child welfare aid be designated as a separate budget program beginning July 1, 2012." As a result, Budget Program 354 was established for child welfare.

#### **Progress Summary**

This is the expenditure and outcomes report required by 81-3133. The next report as required Neb. Rev. Stat. § 81-3133 will be provided by October 30, 2015.

Outcomes reported are from COMPASS (Children's Outcomes Measured in Protection and Safety Statistics). These measures reflect federal performance measures that DHHS is held accountable for by the federal Administration for Children and Families.

| Reunification Composite                            | The Reunification Composite looks at timeliness and permanency of reunifications. The Reunification Composite includes four measures: Reunification in Less Than 12 Months, Median Time to Reunification, Entry Cohort Reunification in Less Than 12 Months, and Permanence of Reunification.   |




## **Absence of Maltreatment Recurrence - COMPASS Measures**



This is Federal Measure that reports on a rolling 12 month period. Data Source: N-FOCUS COMPASS-State wards. The children included in this report were victims of abuse or neglect during the first six months of the 12 month period. If the child was a victim of a subsequent abuse or neglect incident within 6 months of the first incident of abuse or neglect they appear on this report. Victims are defined as children where the court or DHHS has substantiated the allegations of abuse or neglect.




## **Absence of Maltreatment in Foster Care - COMPASS Measures**




This is a Federal Measure that reports on a rolling 12 month period. Data Source: N-FOCUS COMPASS-State wards. This measure is of all children who are placed outside of their parental home either in a foster home or group care, the percent that were not abused or neglected by either a foster parent or a facility staff member.



## **Timeliness & Permanency of Reunification - COMPASS Measures**




This is a Federal Composite Measure. Data Source: N-FOCUS COMPASS- State Wards. This is a Federal Measure that reports on a rolling 12 month period. The Reunification Composite measures the timeliness of reunification and whether the reunification was permanent over a specific period of time. The Reunification Composite includes four measures: Reunification in Less Than 12 Months, Median Time to Reunification, Entry Cohort Reunification in Less Than 12 Months, and Permanence of Reunification.




This is a Federal Composite Measure: Data Source: N-FOCUS COMPASS- State wards. This is a Federal measure that reports on a rolling 12 month period. The Adoption Composite measures the timeliness of adoptions and includes the following five measures: Adoption in less than 24 Months, Median Time to Adoption, Children in care for 17 Months or Longer Who Are Adopted by the End of the Year, Children in Care for 17 Months or Longer Who Are Legally Free for Adoption within 6 Months, and Children Who Are Legally Free for Adoption Who Are Adopted within 12 Months.



## **Permanency for Children in Foster Care - COMPASS Measures**



This is a Federal Composite Measure that reports on a rolling 12 month period. Data Source: N-FOCUS COMPASS-State Wards The Permanency Composite measures the frequency that permanency is achieved for children and youth who have been in care for longer periods of time. Permanency is defined as exiting care to reunification, adoption or guardianship. The Composite includes three measures: 1. Exits to Permanency Prior to the Child's 18th Birthday for Children in Care for 24 More Months or More; 2. Exits to Permanency for Children Who are Free for Adoption; and 3. Children Emancipated Who Were in Foster Care for 3 Years or More.



This is the Federal Composite Measure on Placement Stability. This is a Federal Measure that reports on a rolling 12 month period. Data Source: N-FOCUS COMPASS-State wards. The national standard is 2 or fewer placements over specific periods of time. Placements are not counted for children who experience a brief hospitalization or for children who are on runaway status.
