- 25 (4) Specific private civil cause of action to remedy consumer harm;
- 26 (5) Deceptive trade practices under the Uniform Deceptive Trade
- 27 Practices Act;

- 11 Sec. 6. Occupational board means a board, commission, department,
- or other entity created by state law which regulates providers.
- Sec. 7. <u>Occupational license means a nontransferable authorization</u>
- 14 <u>in law (1) for an individual to perform exclusively a lawful occupation</u>
- 15 <u>for compensation based on meeting personal qualifications established by</u>
- 16 the Legislature and (2) which is required in order to legally perform the
- 17 lawful occupation for compensation.
- 18 Sec. 8. (1) Occupational regulation means a statute, rule,
- 19 regulation, practice, policy, or other state law requiring an individual
- 20 <u>to possess certain personal qualifications or to comply with registration</u>
- 21 requirements to use an occupational title or work in a lawful occupation.
- 22 (2) Occupational regulation includes certification, registration,
- 23 <u>and occupational licensure.</u>
- 24 (3) Occupational regulation does not include business licensure,
- 25 facility licensure, building permit requirements, or zoning and land-use
- 26 regulation except to the extent that the same state laws that require a
- 27 business license, a facility license, a building permit, or zoning and
- 28 land-use regulation also regulate an individual's personal qualifications
- 29 to perform a lawful occupation.
- 30 Sec. 9. <u>Personal qualifications means criteria related to an</u>
- 31 individual's personal background and characteristics, including

- 1 <u>completion of an approved educational program, satisfactory performance</u>
- 2 on an examination, work experience, other evidence of attainment of
- 3 requisite skills or knowledge, moral standing, criminal history, and
- 4 completion of continuing education.
- 5 Sec. 10. Provider means a provider of goods or services engaged in
- 6 <u>a lawful occupation regulated by an occupational board, including, but</u>
- 7 not limited to:

- 5 Sec. 12. (1) Specialty occupational license for medical
- 6 reimbursement means a nontransferable authorization in law for an
- 7 individual to qualify for payment or reimbursement from a government
- 8 agency for the nonexclusive provision of medical services based on
- 9 <u>meeting personal qualifications established by the Legislature.</u>
- 10 (2) A specialty occupational license for medical reimbursement may
- 11 <u>be recognized by a private company.</u>
- 12 Sec. 13. For purposes of the Occupational Board Reform Act:
- 13 (1) Certification and registration are not synonymous with
- 14 occupational licensure;
- 15 (2) When the terms certification and certified are used outside of
- 16 the Occupational Board Reform Act to mean a requirement that an
- 17 <u>individual meet certain personal qualifications to work legally, those</u>
- 18 terms in that context shall be interpreted for purposes of the
- 19 Occupational Board Reform Act as requiring an individual to meet the
- 20 requirements for an occupational license; and
- 21 (3) When the terms registration and registered are used outside of
- 22 <u>the Occupational Board Reform Act to mean a requirement that an</u>

- 27 Sec. 14. (1) Occupational regulations shall be construed and
- 28 applied to increase economic opportunities, promote competition, and
- 29 <u>encourage innovation.</u>
- 30 (2) It is the policy of the State of Nebraska:
- 31 (a) To protect the fundamental right of an individual to pursue a

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- 1 lawful occupation;
- 2 (b) To use the least restrictive regulation necessary to protect
- 3 consumers from present, significant, and substantiated harms that
- threaten public health and safety when competition alone is not 4
- 5 sufficient;
- 6 (c) To enforce an occupational regulation against an individual only
- 7 to the extent that the individual sells goods and services that are
- 8 included explicitly in the statute that governs the lawful occupation's

- 10 (d) To provide ongoing legislative review of occupational regulation

- (1) The fundamental right of an individual to pursue an 12 Sec. 15.
- 13 occupation includes the right of an individual with a criminal history to
- 14 obtain an occupational license, a specialty occupational license for
- 15 medical reimbursement, or government certification or state recognition
- 16 of the individual's personal qualifications.
- 17 (2)(a) An individual who has a criminal conviction may petition the
- appropriate occupational board at any time, including prior to obtaining 18
- 19 required education or paying any fee, for a determination as to whether
- the individual's criminal conviction would disqualify the individual from 20
- 21 obtaining an occupational license, a specialty occupational license for
- 22 medical reimbursement, or government certification or state recognition
- 23 of the individual's personal qualifications from that occupational board.
- 24 (b) The individual may include with the petition additional
- 25 information about the individual's current circumstances, including the
- 26 time since the offense, completion of the criminal sentence, other
- 27 evidence of rehabilitation, testimonials, employment history, and
- 28 employment aspirations.
- 29 (3) Upon receipt of a petition under subsection (2) of this section
- 30 and a fee if required under subsection (7) of this section, the
- 31 appropriate occupational board shall make a determination of whether the

- individual's criminal conviction would disqualify the individual from 1
- 2 obtaining an occupational license, a specialty occupational license for
- 3 medical reimbursement, or government certification or state recognition
- of the individual's personal qualifications from that occupational board. 4
- 5 In making such determination, an individual's criminal history shall only
- 6 <u>disqualify the individual if:</u>
- 7 (a) The individual has a felony conviction;
- 8 (b) The felony conviction is expressly listed as a disqualifying
- 9 offense in the statutes governing occupational regulation by the
- occupational board; and 10
- (c) The occupational board concludes that the state has an important 11
- 12 interest in protecting public safety that outweighs the individual's
- right to pursue an occupation. The occupational board may come to this 13
- 14 conclusion only if it determines, by clear and convincing evidence at the
- 15 time of the petition, that (i) the specific offense for which the
- individual was convicted is substantially related to the state's public 16
- safety interest, (ii) based on the nature of the specific offense for 17
- which the individual was convicted and the individual's circumstances at 18
- 19 the time of the petition, the individual is more likely to re-offend by
- 20 virtue of having the license, certification, or recognition than if the
- 21 individual did not have the license, certification, or recognition, and
- 22 (iii) another offense by the individual will cause greater harm than it
- 23 would if the individual did not have the license, certification, or
- 24 recognition.
- 25 (4) The occupational board shall issue its determination in writing
- 26 within ninety days after receiving a petition under subsection (2) of
- 27 this section. The determination shall include findings of fact and
- conclusions of law. If the occupational board determines that the state's 28
- 29 public safety interest outweighs the individual's right, the occupational
- 30 board may advise the individual of any action the individual may take to
- remedy the disqualification. If the occupational board finds that the 31

- 1 <u>individual</u> has been convicted of a subsequent felony, the occupational
- 2 <u>board may rescind a determination upon finding that the subsequent felony</u>
- 3 <u>conviction would be disqualifying under subsection (3) of this section.</u>

- 5 <u>board</u>. The appeal shall be in accordance with the Administrative

- requirement of using the least restrictive regulation necessary to 6
- 7 protect consumers, the legislative committee shall presume that market
- 8 competition and private remedies are sufficient to protect consumers.
- 9 (3) The presumption in subsection (2) of this section may be
- overcome if the legislative committee finds empirical evidence of a 10
- 11 systematic problem that warrants more restrictive regulation to protect
- 12 consumers. If such a problem is present in the state, the legislative
- 13 committee shall recommend the least restrictive regulation that addresses
- 14 the problem. The legislative committee shall use the following guidelines
- 15 to form its recommendation:
- 16 (a) If the need is to protect consumers against fraud, the likely
- recommendation will be to strengthen powers under the Uniform Deceptive 17
- Trade Practices Act or require disclosures that will reduce misleading 18
- 19 attributes of the specific goods or services;
- 20 (b) If the need is to protect consumers against unclean facilities
- 21 or to promote general health and safety, the likely recommendation will
- 22 be to require periodic inspections of such facilities;
- 23 (c) If the need is to protect consumers against potential damages
- 24 from failure by providers to complete a contract fully or up to
- 25 standards, the likely recommendation will be to require that providers be
- 26 bonded;
- 27 (d) If the need is to protect a person who is not party to a
- contract between the provider and consumer, the likely recommendation 28
- 29 will be to require that the provider have insurance;
- 30 (e) If the need is to protect consumers against potential damages by
- 31 transient providers, the likely recommendation will be to require that

- 1 providers register their businesses with the Secretary of State;
- 2 <u>(f) If the need is to protect consumers against a shortfall or</u>
- 3 imbalance of knowledge about the goods or services relative to the
- 4 providers' knowledge, the likely recommendation will be to enact
- 5 <u>voluntary private or government certification; and</u>
- 6 (g) If the need is to qualify providers of new or highly specialized
- 7 medical services for reimbursement by the state, the likely
- 8 recommendation will be to enact a specialty license for medical
- 9 <u>reimbursement</u>.
- 10 Sec. 17. A standing committee of the Legislature may:
- 11 (1) Request proponents of legislation that would enact or modify
- 12 <u>occupational regulations to submit evidence of present, significant, and</u>
- 13 substantiated harm to consumers in Nebraska; and
- 14 (2) Request information from sources other than proponents who are
- 15 <u>knowledgeable regarding the proposed occupational regulations, the effect</u>
- on labor economics, and other relevant factors.
- 17 Sec. 18. <u>Each standing committee of the Legislature shall review</u>
