This bill establishes the Dialysis Patient Care Technician Registration Act. The bill has the e-clause.

Dialysis patient care technicians would be regulated by the Uniform Credentialing Act. Certain requirements would have to be met to fulfill the registration requirements. There are approximately 100 dialysis patient care technicians. The Department of Health and Human Services would need a half-time licensing specialist. The cost would \$28,878 in FY 2017-18 and \$26,878 in FY 2018-19. Rates for the regulation of professions covered under the Uniform Credentialing Act are based on a pooled allocation. The registration fee is estimated to be \$80. The estimated revenue is \$8,000 every other year. The funding pool would cover the balance of the costs.
