- 11 Sec. 3. (1) A practitioner who is prescribing an opiate for a
- 12 patient younger than nineteen years of age for outpatient use for an
- 13 <u>acute condition shall not prescribe more than a seven-day supply except</u>
- 14 <u>as otherwise provided in subsection (2) of this section and, if the</u>
- 15 practitioner has not previously prescribed an opiate for such patient,
- 16 <u>shall discuss with a parent or guardian of such patient the risks</u>
- 17 <u>associated with use of opiates and the reasons why the prescription is</u>
- 18 <u>necessary.</u>
- 19 (2) If, in the professional medical judgment of the practitioner,
- 20 more than a seven-day supply of an opiate is required to treat such
- 21 patient's medical condition or is necessary for the treatment of chronic
- 22 pain management or pain associated with a cancer diagnosis or for
- 23 palliative care, the practitioner may issue a prescription for the
- 24 quantity needed to treat such patient's medical condition or pain. The
- 25 practitioner shall document the medical condition triggering the
- 26 <u>prescription of more than a seven-day supply of an opiate in the</u>
- 27 patient's medical record and shall indicate that a nonopiate alternative
- 28 was not appropriate to address the medical condition.
- 29 (3) This section does not apply to controlled substances prescribed
- 30 pursuant to section 28-412.
