## Summary of purpose and/or changes:

LB 733 would amend the Election Act to provide additional requirements relating to polling place accessibility for persons with disabilities. These would include detailed requirements for handicap-accessible parking accommodations, exterior routes to accessible entrances, the entrances themselves, signage, routes from entrances to the voting area, the voting area itself, ramps in or outside of the polling place, and lifts/elevators.

The bill would also require the Secretary of State to provide biennial training for election commissioners and county clerks relating to these accessibility standards. It would also require training for poll workers.

## **Explanation of amendments:**

The committee amendment, AM 738, removes most of the dimensional and other physical specifications in the introduced version of the bill, and instead provides a list of characteristics that must be in compliance with the federal Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), and the Help America Vote Act (HAVA). The amendment also clarifies the related duties of the Secretary of State, including a training manual that the Secretary will produce, and biennial training for

election commissioners and county clerks on accessibility standards. The amendment language also provides that poll workers must receive training on accessibility after they are appointed and before they serve in an election.
