Summary of purpose and/or changes:

LB832 would create civil and criminal immunity for property damage caused by a person removing a child from a locked vehicle.

The bill includes five requirements for the immunity to apply. First, the person had a good faith and reasonable belief that breaking into the vehicle was necessary because the child was in imminent danger of harm. Second, the person must also have determined that the vehicle was locked and there was no other reasonable method for the child to exit with assistance. Third, the person notified law enforcement before or as soon as practicable after breaking into the car. Fourth, the person used no more force than reasonable necessary.

The fifth requirement, with an exception, is the person remained with the child near the vehicle until emergency personnel, the parent or guardian, or owner of the vehicle arrived. The person may leave the area to protect the health and safety of the child if the person notifies law enforcement and leaves a note.

Explanation of amendments:

AM2293 replaces the original bill.

The amendment would add a new subsection to Sec. 25-2,186, also known as the Good Samaritan law. The existing law provides immunity for a person rendering emergency care at the scene of an accident or other emergency. The new subsection would include entering a vehicle to remove a child to avoid immediate harm to the child in the definition of rendering emergency care at the scene of an accident or other emergency.
