| 4 | to change provisions relating to training requirements and shaken |
| 5 | baby syndrome; to harmonize provisions; and to repeal the original |
| 6 | sections. |
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7 Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

Section 1. Section 43-2606, Revised Statutes Cumulative Supplement,
 2018, is amended to read:

3 43-2606 (1) The Department of Health and Human Services shall adopt and promulgate rules and regulations for mandatory training requirements 4 5 for providers of child care and school-age-care programs. Such requirements shall include preservice orientation and at least four hours 6 of annual inservice training. All child care programs required to be 7 licensed under section 71-1911 shall show completion of a preservice 8 9 orientation approved or delivered by the department prior to receiving a 10 provisional license.

(2) The department shall initiate a system of documenting the
 training levels of staff in specific child care settings to assist
 parents in selecting optimal care settings.

(3) The training requirements shall be designed to meet the health, 14 safety, and developmental needs of children and shall be tailored to the 15 licensed providers of child care programs. 16 needs of Preservice orientation and the training requirements for providers of child care 17 programs shall include, but not be limited to, information on sudden 18 unexpected infant death syndrome, abusive head trauma in infants and 19 children, crying plans shaken baby syndrome, and child abuse. 20

shall provide 21 (4) The department or arrange for training 22 opportunities throughout the state and shall provide information 23 regarding training opportunities to all providers of child care programs at the time of registration or licensure, when renewing a registration, 24 25 or on a yearly basis following licensure.

(5) Each provider of child care and school-age-care programs
 receiving orientation or training shall provide his or her social
 security number to the department.

(6) The department shall review and provide recommendations to the
Governor for updating rules and regulations adopted and promulgated under
this section at least every five years.

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Sec. 2. Section 71-2102, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, is
 amended to read:

3 The Legislature finds that shaken baby syndrome is the 71-2102 4 medical term used to describe the violent shaking of an infant or child 5 and the injuries or other results sustained by the infant or child. The Legislature further finds that abusive head trauma shaken baby syndrome 6 may occur when an infant or child is violently shaken as part of a 7 pattern of abuse or because an adult has momentarily succumbed to the 8 9 frustration of responding to a crying infant or child. The Legislature 10 further finds that the these injuries sustained by the infant or child can include brain swelling and damage, subdural hemorrhage, intellectual 11 disability, or death. The Legislature further finds and declares that 12 13 there is a present and growing need to provide programs aimed at reducing 14 the number of cases of abusive head trauma in infants and children shaken 15 baby syndrome in Nebraska.

16 Sec. 3. Section 71-2103, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, is 17 amended to read:

71-2103 Every hospital, birth center, or other medical facility that 18 discharges a newborn child shall request that each maternity patient and 19 father of a newborn child, if available, view a video presentation and 20 read printed materials, approved by the Department of Health and Human 21 Services, on the dangers of shaking infants and children, the symptoms of 22 abusive head trauma in infants and children shaken baby syndrome, the 23 24 dangers associated with rough handling or the striking of an infant, safety measures which can be taken to prevent sudden infant death 25 including crying plans, and the dangers associated with infants sleeping 26 in the same bed with other children or adults. After viewing the 27 presentation and reading the materials or upon a refusal to do so, the 28 hospital, birth center, or other medical facility shall request that the 29 mother and father, if available, sign a form stating that he or she has 30 viewed and read or refused to view and read the presentation and 31

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1 materials. Such presentation, materials, and forms may be provided by the 2 department.

3 Sec. 4. Section 71-2104, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, is
4 amended to read:

5 71-2104 The Department of Health and Human Services shall conduct 6 public awareness activities designed to promote the prevention of sudden 7 infant death syndrome and <u>abusive head trauma in infants and children</u> 8 shaken baby syndrome. The public awareness activities may include, but 9 not be limited to, public service announcements, information kits and 10 brochures, and the promotion of preventive telephone hotlines.

11 Sec. 5. Section 79-1902, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, is 12 amended to read:

13 79-1902 (1) The State Department of Education, in cooperation with 14 the Department of Health and Human Services, shall develop a packet 15 entitled "Learning Begins at Birth" to be given to the parents of each 16 child born in this state on and after January 1, 2003.

17 (2) The packet shall contain information about child development, child care, how children learn, children's health including, on and after 18 July 14, 2006, information on <u>decreasing</u> the <u>risk</u> prevention of sudden 19 unexplained infant death syndrome and abusive head trauma in infants and 20 children shaken baby syndrome, services available to children and 21 parents, and any other information deemed relevant by the Department of 22 23 Health and Human Services or the State Department of Education. The State 24 Department of Education shall indicate which information in the packet is appropriate for the parents of infants, for the parents of toddlers, and 25 for the parents of preschoolers. 26

(3) The State Department of Education shall develop a variety of types of the packet, based on the needs of parents. The information in the packets may be in the form of printed material or in the form of video tapes, audio cassettes, or other appropriate media.
