Job Skills Report: 2022, Quarter 1

The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Medicaid and Long-Term Care, provides the following update regarding the statutory requirements in Neb. Rev. Stat. 68-997 surrounding the referral of Medicaid applicants to job skills program for the first calendar quarter of 2022:

The Division of Medicaid and Long-Term Care (MLTC) collaborated with the Division of Children and Family Services in the fourth quarter of 2021 to provide Medicaid applicants with information on the SNAP Employment and Training (SNAP E&T) program. The purpose of the SNAP E&T program is to “get under-employed and unemployed clients on SNAP into jobs that pay a livable wage.” More information on the SNAP E&T program is available on the [DHHS Website](#).

In the first quarter of 2022, MLTC continued providing information on the SNAP E&T program to individuals seeking Medicaid applications, as many people who are eligible for Medicaid are also eligible for SNAP benefits. Between January 1 and March 31, 2022, Medicaid field staff provided information on the SNAP E&T program to 1,408 individuals who visited DHHS’s local offices across the state, a decrease of 21 percent compared to last quarter’s report. These individuals received Medicaid applications from the local offices that included [flyers](#) ([Spanish version](#)) on the SNAP E&T program. DHHS also noted 3,555 visits to the SNAP E&T webpage from January 1 to March 31, 2022, a decrease in traffic of 9 percent compared to last quarter’s report.

From January 1 to March 31, the SNAP E&T program did not receive any inquiries from Medicaid applicants interested in participating in the SNAP E&T program.

MLTC continues to seek additional ways to refer interested Medicaid applicants to job skills programs.
