**Any Fiscal Notes received from state agencies and political subdivisions are attached following the Legislative Fiscal Analyst Estimate.**

LB 283 would provide for year-round daylight savings time. The standard time for central time zone shall be minus 5 hours and the western time zone shall be minus 6 hours of the Coordinated Universal Time. The bill retains the opening and closing times for polls in the western and central time zones. Sick and vacation time shall be balanced as of December 31 at 11:59 p.m. in accordance to the change of the time zone, if so enacted.

The change will not be operative until (1) the provisions are authorized, or not in conflict, with United States laws/orders, and (2) two states adjacent to Nebraska adopt laws for a single year-round standard of time.

If the provision to enact year-round daylight savings time is not enacted, the bill proposes that daylight saving time dates in Nebraska would need revision in statute as prescribed in the Uniform Time Act. The start date in statute would be changed from the first Sunday in April to the second Sunday in March. The end date in statute would be changed from last Sunday in October to the first Sunday in November.
