Since July 1, 2020: Since July 1, 2020, the 911 Service System Committee continues its role in advising the Commission on the implementation, coordination, operation, management, maintenance and funding of the 911 Service System. Specifically, a new Next Generation 911 funding model was developed, recommended, and adopted by the Commission in November of 2020. Additionally, the Committee established a training working group to develop minimum training standards for telecommunicators and in November of 2021 the Commission adopted the recommended training standards that became effective January 1. 2022. In 2023, those training standards were amended to include the requirement that Telecommunicator CPR also be a mandatory component of training. In 2024, the Committee established a working group to developed and recommended standards to allow for callers between 911 and the National Suicide Hotline (988) to transfer calls between the two entities. Those standards became effective in December 2024.

Throughout 2024, Alzheimers Disease and Other Dementia Advisory Council has been working to create a State Alzheimers Plan to provide legislators and the Governor with a brief background on dementia, the impact of the disease on individuals who have been diagnosed, their families, the health care system in Nebraska, and other topics outlined in statute. The Plan identifies challenges, such as public awareness of brain health, the lack of adequate staffing of medical and non-medical care providers, and the availability of resources and assistance in rural communities, and makes recommendations to address them. The Council will provide the report to the Legislature in the first quarter of 2025. They will begin delving into these issues throughout 2025 and will provide status reports to the Legislature and Governor annually.

Since July 1, 2020: In the 2020 Legislative Session, successful passage of LB755 amended the Engineers and Architects Regulation Act (Act) to primarily reduce unnecessary barriers to licensure. It removed the requirement that professional engineer license candidates need to gain four years of experience prior to sitting for their national engineering exam. Candidates still need to gain the four years of experience before licensure, but the board removed it as a prerequisite for admittance to the engineering exam. The bill also removed the requirement that architect license candidates apply to the board for approval to take the national architectural exam, while keeping exam passage as a requirement for licensure. The bill also added degrees from Canadian-accredited institutions as satisfying the education requirement for licensure for both architects and professional engineers. The Board has also updated and modernized its regulations on three occasions since July 2020. In addition to making necessary changes to its rules due to passage of LB755, rules changes included clarifying what information licensees need to include on a set of drawings or plans, removing the need for those who fail an engineering examination four or more times to present evidence of additional education to the Board, increased the amount of gualified educational debt the Board may repay gualified architecture and engineering graduates, additions to the licensee Code of Conduct, and revising rules related to a projects coordinating professional. The Nebraska Board of Engineers and Architects held special operational planning meetings on May 4, 2021, May 5, 2022, May 4, 2023, and May 24, 2024. Several board members have had the privilege to serve on national boards through their Nebraska-board appointment. Professional engineer board members Jan Bostelman and Jason Suelter served on the Board of Directors for the National Council of Examiners for Engineers and Surveyors (NCEES), and architect board member Lenora Nelson served on the board for the National Council of Architectural Registration Boards (NCARB). Both NCEES and NCARB are organizations composed of state licensing boards like us, and primarily support and advance licensure in order to safeguard the health, safety, and welfare of the public. The Board continues to see large increases in its compliance workload. The Act mandates that projects of a certain size and complexity must involve licensees if the project constitutes the practices of engineering or architecture. Prior to FY2016-17, the Board averaged about 20 active compliance cases per year. Since then, and with increased partner agency support, the Boards active caseload averages 43 active compliance cases and reviews

hundreds of plans for compliance with the Act per year. The compliance caseload was large enough that the Board sought and was approved to hire an additional FTE to assist with the compliance caseload. The Board honors newly-licensed architects and professional engineers with a ceremony at the Capitol each November. At the ceremony, the Board presents new licensees with their license wall certificate. The ceremony is extremely well-received by new licensees, their families, and architectural and engineering professional organizations; and is a testament to the states commitment to protecting the health, safety, and welfare of its citizens. In 2022, the Board began regular online webinars, held on a guarterly basis. Topics of these ranged from reviewing renewal and continuing education requirements for regulated licensees to reviewing Act requirements that stipulate when an architect or professional engineer is required on a project. The latter webinars were targeted to local building officials to both make them aware of the Board and to be a resource for project owners in their locality when a project involving the practices of engineering and architecture is built. In 2023, the Board reduced operating expenses by moving its licensee newsletter from a printed publication to electronic.

Since July 1, 2020: These accomplishments are provided by the Department of Health and Human Services and reflects its sole views. In 2023, the Nebraska Center for Nursing (NCN) kicked off a campaign to market nursing. The Learfield campaign has energized the marketplace by using the NCN website to connect prospective students to nursing schools and licensed nurses to the Nebraska job market representing every county in Nebraska. The NCN also entered a partnership with the Nebraska Hospital Association (NHA) to expand clinical training sites for nurses in Nebraska and other nursing promotional activities. The centerpiece of this partnership was creation of a shared clinical model to create new clinical education sites for nursing students in critical access hospitals in Nebraska, in collaboration with local schools of nursing, in a true practice-academic partnership. In the first year, nine rural Nebraska hospitals and six academic institutions began collaborating via this model for an increase of 108 additional nursing students admitted to programs in fall 2024. This innovative model also includes student travel and housing expenses for the rural clinical rotations, as well as clinical instructor education. Other projects launched in the NCNNHA partnership include an infusion of simulation equipment for Nebraska approved schools and hospital-based programs, a joint effort that provides simulation equipment access to both rural settings and schools. Statewide onboarding of nursing students is under review to develop a new system that streamlines student credentialing for clinical sites across the state. A new student nurse internship has also been launched to provide rural hospitals an opportunity to host nursing students and develop relationships that lead to potential local job placement upon graduation from a nursing program. In the first year of this program, 16 student nurses completed their internship, with 11 of 16 being hired fulltime while completing their nursing degree.

Accomplishments

Since July 1, 2020: The Nebraska Coalition for Juvenile Justice helps with funding recommendations through the Community-based Juvenile Services Aid and the Juvenile Services Commission Grant Program grants. These grants have a combined funding amount of \$6,362,300 each year that is distributed to counties, tribes, and non-profit agencies. These funds assist with providing prevention and intervention type services for youth under the age of 19 at risk of becoming juvenile justice system involved across the state of Nebraska. An annual Governors report is completed by the Coalition outlining the accomplishments for the years. This report also includes a breakdown of the funding recommendations and allocations. Coalition members attend an annual conference sponsored by OJJDP in order to provide a voice for Nebraska and bring back innovative and new practices that could be implemented within the committee. Beginning in 2022, Nebraska was approached by OJJDP Administrator Liz Ryan about returning to participation in the Title II Part B Formula Grant Program, which brings additional funding to Nebraska for programs and interventions to reduce juvenile justice system involvement and improve outcomes for the young people in Nebraska. The Coalition and the Nebraska Crime Commission worked together to write a three-year plan, examine data, identify priority areas, and complete the application process. Nebraska was awarded a Title II Part B Formula Grant in December 2023. Moving forward, the Coalition will be instrumental in reviewing applications, guiding funding decisions, reviewing updated data, and recommending policy and programmatic changes through Title II and the state juvenile grants.

Passage of Appropriations Bill Establishing Missing and Murdered Indigenous People Liaison in Nebraska Attorney Generals Office (2023): This bill established a permanently funded position based in the Nebraska Attorney Generals office for a dedicated MMIP liaison tasked with outreach, education and liaison work addressing issues related to missing Native men, women and children.

Search for Gravesites at Genoa Indian School (2022): In partnership with History Nebraska State Archeologist and Midwest Archeological Center conducted ground penetrating survey of identified possible burial locations of Native students.

Indigenous Peoples Day (2022): Acting as a supporting partner with The Chief Standing Bear Project assisted in the planning and implementation of a Standing Bear Courage Prize awarded to Native American Actor Wes Studi at an October event for 250 attendees. The prize event was the 2022 Indigenous Peoples Day event.

Completion of and Public Airing of Dr. Susan La Flesche Picotte Documentary (2022): Utilizing private donations and grants, produced a documentary about the legacy of Dr. Susan La Flesche with the premier airing in September. In partnership with the Lied Center for the Performing Arts this movie is also available as a curriculum tool available for use by teachers across the state of Nebraska.

Passage of LR 271 Standing Bear Justice Administration Building (2022): Worked with State Senator Tom Brewer and director of state administrative services to introduce and pass a resolution to rename state administrative services building the Chief Standing Bear Justice Administration Building. Dedication ceremony held on July 21st, 2022 unveiling Standing Bear sculpture, mural and new building signage.

Sovereign Native Youth Leadership Academy (2022): Partnership with UNLs Mid American Transportation Center to hold annual Youth Leadership Academy for 20 students in Lincoln, Nebraska.

NCIA Executive Director Honored as Lincoln Rotary 14 Nebraskan of the Year (2022): Honored as a Nebraskans who has distinguished themselves through service to others in keeping with ideals of Rotary International. 2021 Indigenous Peoples Day Celebration (2021): NCIA played lead role in the development and presentation of Indigenous Peoples Day Celebrations including a tribal flag dedication in the Nebraska State Capitol (est. attendance 150) and Dr. Susan La Flesche Picotte sculpture unveiling in Lincoln, Nebraska on Heritage Plaza-Centennial Mall South (est. attendance 400).

Recipient of Nebraska Department of Education ESSR Grant (2021): NCIA received an initial grant of \$49,500 with a commitment of two additional years of \$50,000 each to address Native American student educational achievement challenges. Report was compiled and completed 2022.

Passage of LB185 to appropriate funds to the Department of Health and Human Services for public health aid (2021): LB 185 provides equitable funding of \$531,000 for the Fred LeRoy Health Center, a Federally Qualified Health Center in Omaha.

Passage of LB 528 Community College Gap Assistance Program (2021): LB 528 was passed to make changes to the Community College Gap Assistance Program The program provides assistance to low-income students who are enrolled in non-credit programs of study in identified high-need occupational areas and for-credit programs of study in the same occupational areas that are too short term to be Pell-eligible.

Development and Distribution of Tribal Crona Comics (2020-21): CRONA Pandemic Comics is a collection of short comics and essays developed to help Native youth understand the complexities of living through a viral pandemic. NCIA partnered with UNL and Native artist Henry Payer to develop culturally appropriate story educating youth about the Coronavirus. Comics are being distributed to tribal schools and students free of charge.

Passage of LB 848 Addition of Indigenous Peoples Day and Tribal Flags Permanent Placement (2020): This bill recognizes the historic, cultural, and contemporary significance of the people indigenous to the lands that are now known as the Americas, including Nebraska, and the many contributions of such people. The flags of the four Nebraska headquartered tribes will be placed in the Warner Legislative Chamber flag. Additionally the flags historic to Nebraska will be placed in the Memorial Chamber on the fourteenth floor of the State Capitol.

Standing Bear Documentary (2020): A documentary recounting the process of nominating Chief Standing Bear for inclusion in Statuary Hall in Washington, DC was created and subsequently premiered to the public at an event at the Lied Center in Lincoln, Nebraska in November, 2020. The Lied started offering the documentary to Nebraska Schools in 2021.

Accomplishments

Since July 1, 2020: The Nebraska Crime Commission oversees the administration of all law enforcement training and certification standards for Nebraska. This effort is addressed in concert with the Police Standards Advisory Council and the Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center. Revisions to the administrative requirements associated with citizens reporting allegations of misconduct as defined in Nebraska Revised Statute 81-1403(6) are found in Nebraska Administrative Code Title 79, Chapter 9. Significant progress has been made to refine the process to address the investigation of informal complaints which could be grounds for revocation of a law enforcement officers certification. The Nebraska Commission on Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice took steps to modify the agency website to post the statutorily required list of decertified officers and the basis for those revocations. Efforts to implement hiring bonuses for new law enforcement officers was implemented beginning in 2023. In addition, the Law Enforcement Officer Attraction and Retention (LEAR) program began issuing payments in 2023 to 2800 law enforcement officers.

Programs funded during the period are further described in the Promotion Highlights of the Annual Report. 2. Southwest Dairy Farmers (Southwest Dairy). Under contract, Southwest Dairy began implementing Mobile Dairy Classroom programs in Nebraska. Programs are further described in the Report of Activities. Nebraska Dairy Promotion HIGHLIGHTS July 1, 2023 -June 30, 2024Dairy Management Inc. (DMI), which represents and implements the priorities, strategies, and programs of the national dairy checkoff program, works on behalf of Americas dairy farmers, including the approximately 80 farmers in Nebraska to protect and grow sales and trust in dairy foods, dairy farmers, and the dairy community. Since July 1, 2020: From July 1, 2020, to June 30, 2024, the Trust has awarded over 257 grants totaling \$67,346,931. In 2023, LB 814 authorized \$14,000,000 to be transferred from the Nebraska Environmental Trust Fund to the Water Resources Cash Fund (\$7,000,000 transferred in FY 23-24 and \$7,000,000 transferred in FY 24-25). These awards fall under the purpose of conserving, enhancing, and restoring the natural physical and biological environment in Nebraska, including the air, land, groundwater, and surface water, flora and fauna, prairies and forests, wildlife, and wildlife habitat and natural areas of aesthetic or scenic values. In 2021, the Trust 22 Committee was established and sought assistance from the Nebraska Center for Operational Excellence to enhance NET's processes. At least twelve items were found in NETs rules and regulations that needed to be addressed. - In May 2022, the Title 137 Committee was created to focus on procedures, policies, and efficiencies in the rules. The committee also concentrated on ensuring that Title 137 was in alignment with state statutes. In September 2022, the Title 137 Committee established a process to promulgate rules and regulations in accordance with the steps outlined in state law. In October and November 2022, public listening sessions were conducted in each Congressional District to allow the public to provide feedback on revisions needed for NETs rules and regulations. A fourth listening session was conducted via Zoom in December 2022 for those unable to attend in person. After navigating through the review and approval process, revisions to Title 137 became effective on August 12, 2023. Updates to the Bylaws of the Nebraska Environmental Trust Board, Board Policies, and the Grant Contract were approved by the NET Board. In July 2023, the Board Office moved to a new location at 2077 N St, Suite 310. The new office space complies with ADA regulations. Accomplishments

Since July 1, 2020: INVESTIGATIONCHARGE PROCESSINGSince July 1, 2020, the NEOC, in conjunction with OCIO, upgraded its case management system. This upgrade has assisted staff in being able to better track contacts from the public, as well as streamline the process from initial contact through post determination. The NEOC continues to look for opportunities to perform its investigative work efficiently, while still ensuring that the NEOC is meeting its mission of eradicating discrimination. One such endeavor was to create a more cohesive investigative unit where investigators are responsible for providing technical assistance, conducting intake interviews, drafting charges, and conducting investigations. Previously these functions were performed by two separate units. By having one unit perform the work, the public is receiving information and service from well-trained employees who are familiar with the whole NEOC process and corresponding laws. While the NEOC has seen an increase in charges filed since July 1, 2020, including a 31% increase in 2324, it has also been able to resolve more cases seeing a 26% increase in case completions. Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) continues to be an important program available to parties to mutually resolve a filed charge. ADR is a voluntary process, and any agreement reached is one that is driven by the parties, with the NEOC acting as the mediatorconciliator. The NEOC has no vested interest in the outcome of any settlement. The NEOC has a 76% success rate of the parties reaching an agreement when the parties participate in the ADR process. Since July 1, 2020, the NEOC has obtained over \$5,000,000.00 in direct monetary relief for Complainants through ADR, settlements during investigations, and reasonable cause conciliations, which are all voluntary processes of the NEOC. In addition to monetary relief, the NEOC obtained targeted equitable relief for Complainants, including neutral references, adverse material removed from files, reasonable accommodations, reinstatement, training, changing in advertising, structural modifications, apologies, and changes to policies and practices. EDUCATION AND OUTREACHThere are several categories of education and outreach activities stemming from the work of the NEOC, in compliance with legislative intention and statutory

requirements. The NEOC, without cost to recipients, has made available speakers who provided technical training, written materials that addressed guidelines for best practices for employers and housing industry professionals, and other technical resources through our website and telephone contact. The NEOC has also addressed employee and housing consumer issues through voluntary and mandatory participation in seminars and other settings. The NEOC has developed cooperative working relationships with federal, state and local partners to share information in the employment and housing industry to assure that anti-discrimination laws are enforced as well as. For the period of July 2020 through June 2024, NEOC staff made over 80 direct presentations to over 1,000 individuals around the state. These presentations included training and discussion regarding disability discrimination in employment and housing, harassment, reasonable accommodations, as well as other requested topics related to the NEOC and the work the NEOC does. These presentations may be the result of requests from the parties or pursuant to relief agreed to in a settlement.In addition to direct presentations, the NEOC has engaged in outreach and education activities through media sources, including a Nebraska Public Media produced 30-minute program focused on housing discrimination. Other activities include public service commercials on NPM and KOLNKGIN television stations, radio stations in the Omaha-metro area, KWTN, the Big Voice, for Winnebago and Omaha Tribes, billboards in Grand Island, a booth at the Nebraska State Fair, bus tail advertising in Lincoln and Omaha, and tables at events such as Disability Pride. These activities enable the NEOC to reach all parts of the state and share information about the NEOC and the state of Nebraskas anti-discrimination laws.

Since July 1, 2020: The Nebraska Grain Sorghum Board continues to maintain its basic programs of market development, research, producer & consumer education and federal legislative affairs. The Grain Sorohum Boards international marketing is done through the United Sorghum Checkoff Program and while attending trade missions. International markets development programs are vital to sorghum producers since about 75% of the U.S. sorghum crop is exported. Key international customers include China, Mexico and Japan. Every year, 15% to 25% of the national checkoff funds collected from Nebraska sorghum farmers gets sent back to the Nebraska Grain Sorghum Board to assist with improving the sorghum industry through research, promotion and education. Growth in food uses for sorghum creates new, high-value demand. The Nebraska Grain Sorghum Board continues their in-state promotion efforts of sorghum for food uses. Educational programs include publication and distribution of recipes, enhanced visibility via social media, etc. Sorghum is gaining awareness and popularity among professional chefs, nutritionists and the healthy consumer. In the last few years, Sorghums use in pet food, primarily dog and cat foods, has been on the rise as the companion animal industry demands high-guality ingredients to incorporate into their formulations. Sorghum processes well into pet food applications and is environmentally friendly. Sorghum is now being utilized by 15 pet food companies in more than 150 products. For human consumption, mainstream brands are adding sorghum to their list of ingredients every year. Producer education efforts include sorghum hybrid demonstration plots, field days, educational seminars, research conferences and farm shows. Board support is also provided through funding or goods and services to other educational and leadership development programs such as the Nebraska FFA, Nebraska Ag Youth Institute, Classroom visits, Ag Day Promotions, and Ag Safety Camps. Program funds invested in federal legislative issues primarily relate to the Farm Bill and Crop Insurance Program and are conducted in collaboration with and through the National Sorghum Producers. Close communication is also maintained with USDA and the EPA and cooperators relative to conservation programs as they impact sorghum farmers. In 2023, National Sorghum Producers (NSP) announced a Climate Smart Commodities Grant by the USDA that will allow NSP to compensate farmers for environmentally friendly practices they utilize in the production of sorghum. The grant is designed as an inset program for biofuels that highlights the eco-friendly aspects of progressive farmers and aims to reward farmers for being good stewards of their

land while also providing opportunities for the development of low carbon programs. Nebraska Grain Sorghum Board has been working closely with National Sorghum Producers to find farmers for this \$47 Million grant. The Board has also voiced their continued support for the Renewable Fuels Standard and Sustainable Aviation Fuel along with any growth that will contribute to rural economic development and job creation.

The Council also approved a new Investment Policy Statement for the OSERS portfolio, which it was set to assume management over in 2017.

The remaining thirteen members represent river basins and are elected for four-year terms at caucuses of the Natural Resources Districts directors residing in that basin. To be eligible, one must be a resident of that basin, have attained the age of majority, and be nominated by one of the board members eligible to vote in that basins caucus. The Commission is responsible for program decisions relating to six funds: the Soil and Water Conservation Fund, the Small Water Sustainability Fund. The Resources Development Fund, the Water Well Decommissioning Fund, the Water Quality Fund, and the Water Sustainability Fund. The Res

Among other changes, the website now includes an archive of all board meeting minutes from December 2017 to the present. The Board also added the ability for users to review all orders issued by the Board that involved a hearing. In May 2020 the Board began livestreaming all its public meetings on Webex. The public and electric utilities can both observe and provide comments using the Webex system. This allows utilities (or the public) that live far from Lincoln (where the Board's meetings are normally held) the ability to watch Board meetings or ask or answer questions, without the need to drive hours to attend a Board meeting in person. This function has been well-received by the utilities and members of the public. From July 2016 to June 2024 the Board held 15 formal evidentiary hearings, approved 40 transmission or distribution lines over 12 mile in length, 38 amendments to public power district charters, and 34 amendments to utility retail service area agreements. The Board also administratively approved 139 transmission or distribution lines less than 12 mile in length.

This report covers topics and statistics related to the telecommunications industry in Nebraska. Highlights of a few of these areas are as follows:Broadband Deployment: The Commission has completed four grant cycles through the Nebraska Broadband Bridge Grant Program, starting with the 2021 calendar year, and is set to make additional awards in January 2025. The program has brought 100100 Mbps (DownUp) broadband to almost 17,000 households in Nebraska. Additionally, the Commission administered federal Capital Projects Funds (CPF) support for broadband deployment. The CPF funds were used to complete 2 grant cycles, bringing service to nearly 10,000 households in Nebraska. Telecommunications Relay Service: The Nebraska Public Service Commission continues to work with the Commission for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing to process applications for the NSTEP program. The TRS Advisory Committee provides continuing advice regarding policies and procedures for the administration of the NSTEP program as well as any relay service issues, including those related to the quality of service provided by the relay center. The advisory committee provides annual recommendations to the Commission relative to setting the surcharge necessary to fund the relay service and the NSTEP voucher program for the following year. Nebraska Universal Service Fund (NUSF): The department also administers the NUSF and has continued to promote awareness of the NUSF support available to schools, libraries, rural health care providers and low-income Nebraskans.Nebraska Telephone Assistance Program (NTAP): The Department continues to promote the NTAP through the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services to approximately 65,000 eligible Nebraskans. Nebraska Statewide Tele-Health Network: The Commission continues this partnership with the healthcare community by providing supplemental funding to health care providers or consortia that receive federal support through the FCCs Healthcare Connect Fund. Nebraska High-Cost Broadband Support: The Commission continues to support deployment of broadband capable networks in high-cost areas. The Commission has stabilized the support coming into the fund through surcharge revenues by modifying the mechanism to be based on connections, instead of as a percentage of assessable revenues. This has led to a more stable and predictable fund. The fund has

Telecommunications DepartmentThe department continues to

supported buildout of broadband-capable fiber-optic voice networks to over 8,300 unserved households through its high-cost programs. Additionally, the fund has supported the buildout of 38 towers through its wireless tower fund to improve cellular phone coverage in the state.State 911 DepartmentFollowing the passage of the 911 Service System Act (LB 938) in 2016, the Commission developed a Master Plan for the provision of Next Generation 911 service to the State of Nebraska. The successful completion of that Master Plan culminated in the passage of LB 993 in 2018. In that same year the Commission established the 911 Service System Advisory Committee. The 911 Service System Advisory Committee established several sub-working groups to make recommendations to the Commission regarding Funding, GIS, Training, Operations and Technical assistance. As a result, the Commission adopted a new Next Generation 911 Funding model, statewide minimum training standards, and developed model policies on Disaster Recovery and Continuity of Operations Plans, Outage Notifications, and established standards for interaction between 911 centers and the National Suicide Hotline (988) in Nebraska. In 2020, the Commission issued a Request for Proposal to contract with telecommunication providers to establish a statewide Emergency Services Internet Protocol Network (ESInet) and Next Generation 911 Core Services (NGCS). In January of 2021, the Commission contracted with Lumen (formerly CenturyLink) to provide these services. Since then, the sixty-seven 911 Centers in Nebraska have connected to the Nebraska NG 911 Service System. The Commission and Lumen continue to work with Originating Service Providers to directly connect their services to the NG 911 Service System. Additionally, the Commission has contracted to provide statewide data analytics and backup location identification services to the 911 centers across the state. Commissioners and staff continue to be involved with 911 and public safety associations locally and nationwide.Natural Gas Department: The Natural Gas Department has been in existence since the passage of the State Natural Gas Regulation Act in 2003. The Department continues to carry out the regulatory functions contained within SNGRA and Commission rules and regulations. In February of 2021, the Commission dealt with the aftermath of Winter Storm Uri, a polar vortex of air that stretched from Canada to San Antonio, and from the Rocky Mountains to the Appalachian Mountains, bringing extremely low, sub-zero temperatures to that entire geographic area of the U.S. Gas wells in Oklahoma and Texas froze, electric generators froze, causing severe supply shortages while demand

spiked to extreme highs. Natural gas prices soared as utilities in a majority of the country, including Nebraskas utilities, sought to buy additional supply to meet the extreme demand created by the cold temperatures. The Commission worked with the jurisdictional utilities to subsidize and recover the Uri costs over months instead of having budget busting bills hit families and businesses in one month. The last of the recovery ended in June of 2024. From 2022 to 2024, The Commission conducted in-depth audits of the gas purchasing and management practices of the jurisdictional utilities in Nebraska. The Commission conducted the audits pursuant to its statutory authority. The audits found no significant issues but included multiple recommendations that have been undertaken by the companies to improve and strengthen procurement, forecasting, and management of the gas supply portfolio of the companies to the benefit of ratepayers. In June 2024, NorthWestern Energy filed an application for a general rate increase. This is the first application for a rate increase from NorthWestern since 2007. The communities served by NorthWestern are negotiating to determine new rates that are subject to approval by the Commission. A decision is expected sometime in 2025. Transportation Department The Legislature passed LB 629 in 2015, which gave the Commission authority over Transportation Network Companies (TNCs). Since that time, the Commission has continued to provide insight in its TNC Annual Report to the Legislature on the impact of TNCs on the taxicab market for both private pay passengers and Medicaid non-emergency medical transportation (NEMT) passengers. In 2020, the Legislature passed LB 461, which resulted in a regulatory scheme change for household goods movers and transporters of railroad train crews. This change has resulted in an influx of household goods movers as well as altered the Commissions regulatory oversight of these types of carriers. In 2022, the Commission collaborated with the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) to be prepared to better gauge the need of additional providers to Medicaid NEMT services. The Commission continues to meet its statutory obligations of inspecting vehicles, sealing taxi meters, reviewing applications for authority, and investigating consumer complaints throughout the State. The Commission continues to collaborate with relevant law enforcement agencies and prosecutors to ensure viable paths in enforcement.Grain Warehouses & Dealers DepartmentUnder the Warehouse Act, Grain Dealer Act, and Weights and Measures Act for Grain Moisture Measuring Devices, the department continues to carry out the regulatory functions contained within the statutes and

Commission rules and regulations to protect the producers of all grain commodities grown in our State. In 2024, the Legislature passed LB 262, which in part increased required security for Warehouses and Dealers. With the increase of additional required security, Nebraska producers have additional protection from loss if there would be a failure. During this reporting period, there has not been a closure which has resulted in a loss to producers. Housing and Recreational VehiclesThe Housing and Recreational Vehicle Department continues to provide regulatory oversight of the production and sale of manufactured homes, recreational vehicles and modular housing units that are constructed andor sold in Nebraska to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the public through the management of the design and the construction of all types of housing produced off-site. The team reviews construction documents, structural calculations, energy computations and guality assurance procedures of each manufacturer. Site inspections at the factories are then performed to assure these structures are built in accordance with the approved documents, adopted building codes, and all applicable State statutes and regulations. The department maintains a cooperative partnership with the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Accomplishments

Since July 1, 2020: Since the voter initiative in 2020 approved the building of casinos at licensed racetrack enclosures, the commission has grown from 2 staff to its current number of 33 staff, and has overseen the growth of the gaming industry in the state. We now have 4 operating casinos with one in Omaha, one in Lincoln, one in Grand Island, and one in Columbus. We have two additional racetracks in the state that are potentially going to open casinos in the next few years. We are working hard to boost the horseracing industry and have seen a very encouraging growth in the number of horses being born in Nebraska. We doubled the number of horse races held in the state in 2024, and this growth will continue. Most notably, due to the 20% tax paid by the gaming operators, the commission has been collecting gaming tax revenue since the first casino opened in the state in September of 2022, and has contributed over \$21,800,000.00 to the state property tax relief credit fund.

Accomplishments Since July 1, 2020:

FY 2016-17The Title 298 rewrite project, begun 3 years prior. incorporated three separate law updates, established cohesiveness with the Real Property Appraiser Act and AMC Registration Act. and incorporated a structure change to be more procedural and easier to follow. Staff reached full strength for the first time in a while, increasing both the long-term and short-term efficiency and effectiveness of the Board and its staff.A couple complex investigative matters were resolved, which allowed the staff to get caught up on the backlog of investigations. The Appraisal Subcommittee audit in March included the fewest issues found in guite a few years. The Director has been working to resolve many ASC audit issues since starting in 2012. The newsletter has been issued for an entire year, and the feedback from the appraiser community has been positive. The Boards relationship with UNO was re-established at the beginning of the fiscal year, which has proven to be beneficial to both sides. Because of this, UNO pursued and was granted AQB approval for its real estate program. Also, the Director had the opportunity to discuss the appraiser profession and the credentialing process with some of the programs students. FY 2017-18The Real Property Appraiser Act was updated to recognize the latest edition of USPAP, and to remove many of the burdensome continuing education requirements. The AMC Registration Act was updated to incorporate the needed changes to implement the AMC Final Rule (federal requirements). The Board continued to build its relationship with the University of Nebraska at Omaha. This relationship has proven to be beneficial for the success of the Universitys Real Estate program and for the Boards mission to increase opportunities to enter the appraiser profession. Currently, the Board is working to allow for individual approval of qualifying education activities at UNO. This would allow students to obtain trainee status as they complete the program. The compliance procedures were updated to streamline the initial review process. Now the Board receives the grievance, supporting documentation, the respondents response, and the respondents report and workfile. The additional information received allows the Board to dismiss a grievance prior to investigation if there is no evidence of a violation. This relieves the stress of the respondent, and saves the Board investigative costs for an investigation that would be dismissed anyway. The temporary credential procedures have been updated to incorporate the temporary credential information into the approval letter for increased efficiency. The new education numbering system has been developed and implemented. The new numbers provide very important information

to staff during review of continuing education submitted with appraiser renewal applications. FY 2018-19LB77 was passed by the Legislature, which included a major law change that opens the door a bit more for future appraisers by reducing requirements and allowing online gualifying education. Title 298 was updated to address previous law changes and issues faced by the Board. This update also included the ability for colleges and universities with AQB approved degree programs to apply to have each course approved as gualifying education individually. This would allow students in an AQB approved degree program apply to become an Trainee Real Property Appraiser while still in school, which will allow the student to begin working in the industry and obtaining appraisal experience before their degree is finished. The Board received excellent ratings from the Appraisal Subcommittee for both its Appraiser Program and its AMC Program. The excellent rating is the Boards first for its Appraiser Program under the current rating system. At the time, Nebraska was the only state to receive an excellent rating for its AMC Program. The Board and staff quickly coordinated the development of the Appraiser Online Renewal Application with Electronic Funds Transfer project and secured funding.Critical funding was obtained for the 2019-2021 Biennium as requested, which includes additional funding for the above mentioned database project. The Board completed an overhaul of its Compliance Program and personnel, which has resulted in a more efficient investigative process. The Compliance Executive Officer position was reclassified to an administrative assistant position, and the Director assumed the lead investigator duties. Staff completed all tasks assigned during the 2018 strategic planning meeting. Major progress was made in the transfer of physical files to electronic files. The office relocation was completed in a seamless manner with no effect on the public. FY 2019-20The Investigation Interface in the NRPAB Database was completed and now is in use. This interface allows staff to carryout all record keeping functions of an investigation in one place in the database, which increases the Boards efficiency and effectiveness. The Education Submission Portal went into use. This portal allows all Nebraska real property appraisers to submit continuing education activities at any time during the year. This portal also feeds into the Education Interface in the NRPAB Database, which is used by staff to review and approve continuing education submissions. The Education Submission Portal greatly reduces the staffs workload during heavy renewal season volume, and increases the efficiency and accuracy of the continuing education record keeping

process. The Board developed procedures to allow approval of online continuing education completed by Nebraska credentialed appraisers that reside out of state for education courses not directly approved by the Board. The Board implemented the following changes for FY 20 to address the challenges of the Covid-19 Pandemic: The Board implemented an essential staffing operating procedure. Staffing levels were maintained in the NRPAB office as needed to carry out essential business only, and to maintain public availability. All of the Board's files and programs could be accessed remotely, so there was no drop off of service to the public or savings andor additional costs due to this operational change. The Board held meetings every other month, and utilized telecommunication as authorized by Governor Ricketts's Executive Order 20-03 and 20-24. This was implemented to provide safety to the Board's more at-risk members because of age or travel distance. Real property appraiser, appraisal management company, and education applications typically approved by the Board, in which no board member judgment or expertise was required (approval granted based on minimum standards being met), were approved by the Director. This operational change was implemented to maintain progress for those applying for credentialing or registration, and to continue growing the appraiser profession at a time when the availability of additional real property appraisers is needed due to market demand. This change also allowed the Board to focus on the most important issues during its meetings, including its Covid-19 response, and credentialing and registration applications that required review with board member expertise. There were no cost savings andor additional costs. The APA completed an audit of the Board's finances in March and April of 2020, for the period July 1, 2018, through December 31, 2019. The Board receives direct feedback from the APA regarding the performance of the Board's accounting practices and procedures. The APA listed no material issues or deficiencies in the April 15, 2020 Attestation Report. The Federal Bureau of Investigation completed a review of the Boards Criminal History Record Check program in conjunction with its audit of the Nebraska State Patrol. The FBI found no issues with the Boards program. FY 2020-21The Board continued to stay on top of federal and industry changes, addressed issues faced by the Board, and opened the door a bit more for new appraisers through relevant law making and rule writing by easing renewal requirements and reciprocal license requirements. The Board updated rules to reflect statutory and industry changes. The Board implemented COVID-19 operating

procedures that were mindful of staff and Board safety with no disruption in services to the public. The online appraiser renewal application went live creating an easy-to-use electronic method of renewing a real property appraiser credential. Major progress made in the project to transfer of physical files to the electronic database. Procedures were developed and implemented to accept online continuing education completed in another jurisdiction.FY 2021-22The appraiser online renewal application has been up and running for one entire renewal cycle. The review system built into the application significantly increased application processing times. The Board has stayed on top of federal and industry changes with law making and rulemaking. All goals related to Laws, Rules, and Guidance Documents were accomplished. The agency underwent a successful Appraisal Subcommittee State Off-site Assessment (SOA) in February 2022. There was no official rating, and staff incorporate all changes recommended by the ASC Policy Managers. The transfer of all appraiser paper files to electronic format was completed. Significant progress was made on multiple technology projects, including database enhancements and virtual conferencing capabilities.FY 2022-23Multiple database and technology projects were completed, including the online AMC registration renewal application and database AMC Interface upgrade, the website disciplinary action search, the restructured website real property appraiser search, the addition of the message screen on the website, and many general website updates.Real property appraiser renewals were completed short staffed with little disruption to the public or the real property appraiser community. The Title 298 changes adopted by the Board on November 17, 2022 were approved by Governor Pillen. The Board is required to comply with federal requirements set forth by the Appraisal Subcommittee, Title XI of FIRREA, and the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act. The Board was audited by the Appraisal Subcommittee on March 14-16 of 2023 and received a rating of Excellent for both the Appraiser Program and the AMC Program. The Appraisal Subcommittee found no weaknesses in the state's regulatory programs. This was the State of Nebraska's third rating of excellent in a row for the Appraiser Program, and the second rating of excellent in a row for the AMC Program (only two compliance review cycles for AMC Programs).PSL funding was secured for an additional teammate.FY 2023-24LB992 was passed by the Legislature, which updates the Real Property Appraiser Act to address USPAP changes, Real Property Appraiser Qualifications Criteria changes, ASC SOA

recommendations, the Board's PAVE Dashboard statute review, removal of the Real Property Appraiser Renewal Random CHRC Program, and other administrative issues. LB989 was passed by the Legislature, which updates the AMC Registration Act to address the ASC SOA recommendations, inclusion of criminal and civil immunity language, changes to the CHRC requirements for owners of more than 10% of an AMC, and other administrative issues. The Business Program Manager position was established and hired for to alleviate staff strain. The overall cash fund balance decline for FY2023-24 was less than the forecasted for the fiscal year because of the Boards conservative and thoughtful use of its funds.

The Boards activities are funded by license and examination fees collected from surveyors. The Board administers applications for examinations of new applicants. The Board examines and provides for the registration and licensure of qualified land surveyors and improves the quality of practicing surveyors by enforcing state law relating to land surveyors. The Board, as a member of the National Council of Examiners for Engineers and Surveyors (NCEES), further protects the public by requiring all land surveyors, is offered year-round. The primary focus of regulation and education are ethical practice, professional competency, and technical proficiency. The Board continues to assure compliance with the 30-hour biennial professional development requirement for registration renewal. The Board monitors and addresses evolving issues including the impact of higher educational standards for registration, the application of advanced land surveying technologies, and the adoption of geographic information systems by the public and private sectors. The Board seeks to protect the citizens through examination for registration, regulation, and continuing education of all professional land surveyors registered in Nebraska. The Board conducts investigations of the actions of professional land surveyors and determines if any person or organization has violated the Land Surveyors Regulation Act. Formal complaints against registered land surveyors shall be heard by the Board. In the event the Board finds any person or organization guilty of charges the Board may issue a	

censure or reprimand, suspend judgement, enforce probation, limit the scope of practice, impose civil penalty, revoke, suspend, or cancel the license, issue a cease and desist order, or dismiss action. A video explaining the Annuity Benefit Options for the School Retirement plan and a recording of the live webinar for School Employer Reporting Agents were also added. 14. The Data Services department processed 36,594 pieces of incoming mail, 265,840 pieces of outgoing mail, and scanned 182,154 documents. There were 692 member accounts validated for service credit. 15. The IT department developed a portal for state and county employers to submit online non-contributing member forms through the NPERS self-service website. 16. The IT department implemented the Microsoft Azure DevOps platform for work management, issue tracking, and release planning of software changes in our pension administration system. 17. As directed by LB 147, NPERS initiated a multi-year project to transfer management of the Omaha Public Schools (OPS) retirement system to NPERS. The transfer will occur on September 1, 2024. NPERS initiated the process for selecting service vendors and submitted a project work plan to the Nebraska Legislature. 18. NPERS Director and Legal Counsel worked cooperatively with the Retirement Systems Committee on legislation, research, analysis, and reports regarding various issues for all of NPERS retirement plans. 19. The Benefits Processing department made additional improvements to the school team's digital calculation workbook, identifying additional standardizations to multiple sheets within the workbook, and expanding the extraction information from NPERS operating system. 20. The Benefits Processing department

Purchase of Service (POS) team held a POS training with NPERS Member Services Department, consisting of four training modules which covered an overview of POS processing, as well as three dedicated modules exploring Air-Time purchases. Out of State purchases, Leave of Absences, and Refund Buybacks. The materials and training modules may be used annually to reinforce and broaden POS acumen within the agency. 21. The Benefits Processing department began utilization of a premier death audit solution to improve death notice procurement, provide more efficient beneficiary payments, and relieve burdens of repayments placed on beneficiaries and families.2020 Accomplishments 1. The number of member accounts in the School, Judges, Patrol, State, County, and Deferred Compensation plans grew from 137,715 in 2019 to a record total of 141,748 in 2020. The total assets of the plans increased from \$16.4 billion in 2019 to a record total of \$16.8 billion in 2020. 2. The Member Services department answered 44,656 phone calls and met with 1,621 members who visited our office for retirement information and counseling. 3. The Benefits Processing department processed 1,889 new retirements across all plans, 131 estimates for purchase of service and 88 actual purchases of service, 43 Qualified Domestic Relations Orders (QDROs), and 16 disability retirements. 4. NPERS distributed over \$940 million in benefits to plan members in all six plans. The benefits included \$731 million in monthly annuity payments to over 30,000 members. NPERS processed 7,143 distributions totaling \$209 million. 5. NPERS exercised careful control of agency expenditures and financial reporting. The financial statements represent accurate and reliable information. 6. The State Auditor audited the State and County plans in the spring and the School. Judges, and Patrol plans in the fall. 7. The PERB approved the Three-Year Internal Audit Plan covering 2021-2023. The Internal Audit Department completed 31 School employer audits and 21 County employer audits. 8. NPERS worked with the actuaries to prepare annual valuation reports for all five plans. In addition, the actuaries updated the 30-year projection models, and completed an actuarial experience study. 9. Effective July 1, 2020, eligible School, Judges, and Patrol retirees received a cost of living adjustment (COLA) in their monthly benefit distributions. The COLA is calculated using the consumer price index and may be capped at 2.5% or 1.0% per plan provisions. For the year ending June 30, 2020, the CPI increase was .52%. As a result, all School, Judges and Patrol retirees received a .52% increase. 10. The State and County Cash Balance (CB) plans exceeded 100% funding as of

December 31, 2019. The PERB voted to grant a 3.00% dividend to State and County CB members. A total of \$53,508,123.23 was awarded to plan members based upon their account balance as of 12312019. 11. The Education Services department used their resources and ingenuity to take our full day seminars entirely on-line, in video format, for both the School and StateCounty plans. Preretirement or Financial Planning Seminars are now accessible to anyone who has an internet connection. 12. The Education Services department established a YouTube channel for NPERS, which allows the agency to track the analytics of each of the videos on the website and on the channel. 13. The Education Services department worked closely with the Nebraska Investment Council to publish the 2020 Investment Report in conjunction with the rollout of the 17 new investment fund options that are available to our Defined Contribution, Deferred Compensation Plan, and Deferred Retirement Option Plan members. This was done along with the production of a new Investment Education Video, numerous website materials, newsletter articles, member correspondence, and seven full form revisions. 6 6 NEBRASKA PUBLIC EMPLOYEES RETIREMENT SYSTEMS 2021 ANNUAL REPORT TO THE LEGISLATIVE RETIREMENT COMMITTEE 14. The Data Services department processed 37,864 pieces of incoming mail, 251,357 pieces of outgoing mail, and scanned 253,241 documents. There were 2,255 member accounts validated for service credit. 15. The IT department and Education Services department, in coordination with the Department of Administrative Services, worked to create an online self-service option to enable state employees to enroll in the Deferred Compensation Plan (DCP) through the DAS Workday system. Workday is the software used by state employees to enroll in and change elections for employee benefit plans. 16. The IT department developed a portal for schools to submit online non-contributing member forms. The forms can be submitted by employer reporting agents and HR contacts through the NPERS self-service website. 17. The IT department completed technical work to enable employees to work remotely in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. This included deploying computers, enabling secure VPN connections, conducting a risk assessment, modifying work processes, and training staff to use technical resources to work remotely. 18. NPERS Director and Legal Counsel worked cooperatively with the Retirement Systems Committee on legislation, research, analysis, and reports regarding various issues for all of NPERS retirement plans. 19. The Benefits Processing department implemented a digital calculation spreadsheet in

response to remote work during COVID-19. The new format standardized entries and data, made access to vital information immediate and user-friendly, and will allow for additional uses and efficiencies for the department. 20. The Benefits Processing department increased efficiency by transitioning School, Judges, and Patrol benefits most commonly used letters to print to mailroom functioning, State and County annuity processing created and implemented digital processing, and additional specialty groups created numerous digital improvements to their processes. 21. The Benefits Processing department welcomed new employees and continued to cross-train multiple staff members in other duties, so work may continue uninterrupted. Multiple trainers expanded their knowledge of digital training platforms, so learning may continue both in-person and online. 22. The Member Services department successfully transitioned to working from home during the COVID-19 pandemic. The Call Center was able to remain fully operational during this time and workflow processes were converted to a digital format.23. The Member Services department successfully conducted its first ever virtual office visit. 24. The Member Services department streamlined part of its process by implementing pre-written notes that can be input into a members file.

In 2022, the MMRC was awarded funding through the Centers for Disease Control and Preventions (CDC) Enhancing Reviews and Surveillance to Eliminate Maternal Mortality (ERASE MM) cooperative agreement. In 2023, a full-time abstractor was hired to support the MMRC. This has increased the ability of the team to accomplish timely case abstraction. The average time from case identification to completed case abstraction decreased from 15 months to 11 months. Due to having cases abstracted in a timely manner, the committee is consistently able to review 100% of cases within 24 months of death. The committee has grown to 19 members in 2024, allowing for membership that represents the population of the state of Nebraska. Additionally, the committee now includes a variety of clinical and non-clinical maternal health stakeholders which allows for multi-disciplinary case reviews. The MMRC has published Maternal Mortality reports in 2021, 2023, and 2024, and published a Severe Maternal Morbidity Report in 2024.
